## Tenth Anniversary Women & Science Fund Raises \$2.6 Million for Women Scientists and Research

omen & Science has much to celebrate. Founded in 1997, the initiative has been a resounding success, attracting a loyal constituency of patrons and friends and raising more than \$10 million for talented women pursuing scientific careers at Rockefeller. To celebrate this decade of achievement—and also to provide valuable funding for women scientists—the Women & Science Tenth Anniversary Fund was launched to support University programs that have the potential to help women scientists. These include faculty recruitment, the Child and Family Center, career development, and pre-Ph.D. education. The Fund will also underwrite 20 Women & Science fellowships. In an outstanding show of support, benefactors contributed more than \$2.6 million to this new effort.

## Tenth Anniversary Spring Lecture and Luncheon Highlights Progress and Prospects for the Future

May 17, 2007 was a spectacular spring day, and the campus was abloom as Women & Science welcomed more than 500 women who gathered for a symposium and luncheon that celebrated the program's Tenth Anniversary. Featured speaker Titia de Lange and panelists Mary Jeanne Kreek and Leslie Vosshall talked about some of the challenges they have overcome as women pursuing scientific careers.
